These pieces reveal the perilous escalation of danger as AI becomes a prominent force in warfare. They shed light on the unsettling consequences of dehumanization on the battlefield, highlighting the risks posed by machines supplanting human roles in conflict scenarios. The integration of AI in war amplifies the potential for heightened danger, dispelling any notion of detachment from violence and emphasizing the ominous implications of AI's growing influence in modern warfare.

Moreover, Rehme's work probes the concept of transhumanism, a central theme in the painting "Transhuman," where organic and synthetic elements intertwine, alluding to the evolving potential of merging human biology with technology. Similarly, "Transformation," adorned with electronic parts, luminous paint, charcoal, and acrylic, symbolizes the coalescence of the digital and the traditional, encouraging reflection on technology's transformative influence.

Rehme's bold inclusion of a robotic sex worker in "A.I. Artificial love" ["K.L. Künstliche Liebe"] prompts poignant discussions on the convergence of technology, intimacy, and ethics. This addition adds a layer of complexity to his exploration, as it raises thought-provoking questions about the implications of human interactions with artificial intelligence, blurring lines between genuine emotions and manufactured experiences.
